



## GOAL 1: increase economic activity


#### **DEFINING GOAL #1**

Strengthen highpotential business
clusters by
expanding the
pipeline to jobs in
these sectors.
Support and
develop job hubs
and assemble land
for businesses.

Focus on LIVABLE WAGES, UPWARD MOBILITY and high-demand sectors.

Link school and training center curricula to the needs of **HIGH-POTENTIAL** businesses.

Replace blight with **OPPORTUNITY** and value-added amenities.



- Identify Gap funding for and attract investment in hard to develop areas
- Link schools and training center curricula to the needs of high potential businesses



## GOAL 2: reduce serious & violent crime

#### **DEFINING GOAL #2**

Achieve consistent annual reduction in the rate of violent crime across the Promise Zone through greater collaboration among police departments. Focus resources in high-crime areas.

Enact professional, **UNIFORM STANDARDS FOR POLICE** and improve relations between the police and the community.

**ENSURE COMMUNITY SAFETY** by increasing funding for police departments to provide adequate manpower.

## GOAL 3: improve educational outcomes

#### **DEFINING GOAL #3**

Ensure students in the Promise Zone are college and career ready by improving schools. Schools will return to accredited status and provide wrap-around services to support children from birth to postgraduation.

#### Expand ACCESS TO EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

and parent education programs.

Promote high school attendance rate.

Return underachieving schools to **ACCREDITATION**.





- 25% increase in number of students reading at grade level by 3<sup>rd</sup> grade
- Ensure all Zone schools have access to child psychologist



# GOAL 4: create sustainable, mixed-income communities

#### **DEFINING GOAL #4**

Design and implement a collaborative strategy for large-scale, mixed-income, mixed-use development that will foster transformative, sustainable communities.

Strengthen 'marginally stable' Promise Zone neighborhoods,

#### TRANSFORMING THEM INTO DESIRABLE PLACES

with adequate infrastructure, funding & partnerships.



- Develop 4 new transformative, mixed income, mixed use developments
- Home repairs in a minimum of 200 Zone homes



## GOAL 5: improve health and wellness


#### **DEFINING GOAL #5**

Address systemic needs and individual interventions to reduce disparities in the life-expectancies of Promise Zone residents.

#### **IMPROVE ACCESS TO HEALTH SERVICES**,

including developmental, behavioral and mental health.

Promote healthy habits and behaviors as well as safe, stable and **HEALTHY LIVING AND LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS.** 



- Work with schools, churches, mental health providers to improve identification/referrals
- Address systemic needs to reduce disparities in life expectancy of Zone residents



## GOAL 6: increase workforce readiness

#### **DEFINING GOAL #6**

Stimulate the economic self-sufficiency of individuals living in low-to-moderate income areas by connecting unemployed and under-employed residents with job readiness, training and placement opportunities.

Serve the underemployed, unemployed and displaced workers, leading to **SUSTAINABLE WORK** and a competitive regional economy.

- Comprehensive skill-based training
- Focused individual employment planning
- Accessible career development and placement services
- Personal finance education/transportation services

## **Certification of Consistency**

#### **OPPORTUNITY**

An applicant engaging in activities and pursuing grant opportunities that are parallel to the goals of the Promise Zone, can receive a Certification of Consistency.

#### **EXPLORATION**

Applicant connects with Promise Zone office to cultivate a Promise Zone related strategy and potential partner discussion.

#### **REVIEW**

Applicants
provide executive
summary of
proposal
according to the
Certification
Process and
Promise Zone
partners provide
feedback on
proposals.

#### **SUPPORT**

Proposals deemed most beneficial to residents and objectives receive a letter of support, improving the applicant's competitiveness in the grant process.


