
A Note From The Promise Zone





2023 Racial Equity Summit

Representatives from diverse departments and projects at the St. Louis Economic
Development Partnership attended the 2023
St. Louis Racial Equity Summit. Their collective insights highlighted the societal impact of inequalities, urging both systemic critique and individual empowerment toward transformative action. Key workshop discussions emphasized an ecosystem approach to anti-racist workplaces, advocating for individual reflection and institutional reform.

The summit and the representative's insights also stressed the importance of promoting community involvement and education to empower residents to help shape a more equitable future for St. Louis and the surrounding community.



St. Louis Anchor Action Network


The St. Louis Anchor Action Network (Network) is working to advance racial equity, remove barriers to economic opportunity and create a more inclusive regional community. The Network is a coalition of large companies and organizations in the St. Louis region, who are working to leverage economic and organizational resources to collectively advance equitable hiring, purchasing and community investment. They are initially focused on 22 zip codes in St. Louis City and County that have faced systemic racial and spatial inequalities.

Real Estate Diversity Initiative

Wrapping up its fifth year, the Real Estate Diversity Initiative (REDI) program provides instruction and project-based real estate development training to people of color and women in the region. Hosted by the Urban Land Institute St. Louis district council, 115 students have participated in this lecture- and project-based program. REDI is designed to advance the real estate knowledge and careers of participants over 15 sessions. Participants learn about the various aspects of development - from site planning to design and construction to finance - and then apply what they learn each week to a case study site in St. Louis. Participants learn from the developer of the case study site and from volunteer faculty, comprised of experienced practicing real estate professionals who serve as instructors, mentors, and facilitators sharing market-based knowledge and wisdom from years of experience. The program concludes with REDI teams presenting their proposals to a panel of real estate professionals who engage the participants and provide constructive feedback.



Neighborhood Leadership Fellows

Neighborhood Leadership Fellows (NLF) is an advanced leadership training program of the University of Missouri-St. Louis, University of Missouri Extension and St. Louis Promise Zone-St. Louis Economic Development Partnership.

The mission of NLF is to increase and amplify the voices of North St. Louis City and County residents at the civic decision-making tables to produce more equitable regional policies for neighborhoods. The primary geographic focus area is neighborhoods within the St. Louis Promise Zone due to the well-documented need for more targeted investment. The Fellows seek to increase and amplify the voices of Promise Zone residents on committees, boards, commissions and in elected office to advocate for more equitable policies. The program lasts for nine-months and addresses systemic change for underrepresented neighborhoods in the region. This year 26 Fellows from the Promise Zone graduated in September 2022 in the 5th cohort of Neighborhood Leadership Fellows.

The NLF continues to develop community leaders and advocates for equity in the Promise Zone. Fellows submitted personal leadership plans, attended various training sessions, and are provided opportunities for networking and individual mentorship.

After in-depth training and mentorship, Fellows will be prepared to lead in a variety of ways, including:

- •Develop and lead training and presentations around issues and assets in North St. Louis
- •Serve on a board or committee or be nominated to serve on a commission
- •Run for elected office
- Implement action steps outlined in the Forward Through Ferguson report

DEFINITIONS

ADOPTED FROM FORWARD THROUGH FERGUSON

Racial Equity.

A state in which a person's life outcomes cannot be predicted by race. When our regional systems work well for all people so that disparities are closed and all residents, regardless of their race and ZIP code, have justice and the opportunity to thrive.

Systemic Racism.

Entrenched institutional policies and practices that systematically disadvantage people of color and systematically benefit white people.

Systems Change.

A theory of change that prioritizes shifting the ways that systems networks of institutions, policies, practices, and people have been structurally and culturally configured to differentially benefit one group over another.



Redeveloping and Cleaning up Brownfields

Located in an Environmental Justice area, the STL Partnership facilitated brownfields cleanup on two adjacent sites at 9844 and 9846 West Florissant that burned during the 2014 civil unrest in Ferguson and Dellwood. The clean up was completed in March 2023.

The site is now being developed into the Urban League Plaza, by The Urban League of Metropolitan St. Louis (ULMSL). The plaza will be a new 13,500 square foot commercial center that will promote economic growth, create new jobs, and foster entrepreneurial endeavors and community wellness for the City of Dellwood and surrounding communities. This multi-use center will serve as an incubator for new businesses, a home for established and committed partners, as well as a place for community services for pregnant people, children, and parents of young children. Prospective, representative tenants include First Bank, At Home Care, Proficient Chiropractic, ULMSL, including space for the Save Our Sisters program, and a local restaurant. The goal is to create around 250 jobs. Urban League

Plaza is planning a groundbreaking in late 2024.

Missouri 2023 Brownfield Conference

The St. Louis Promise Zone had 10 representatives including mayors, council members, and municipal staff attend the Missouri Brownfield Conference on July 9 and 10, 2023 in Osage Beach, MO. Missouri Department of Natural Resources and The Environmental Protection Agency spoke to all attendees about available Brownfield resources for redevelopment activities.

Extending West Florissant Avenue's Equitable Redevelopment Efforts

The City of Jennings is a small municipality in North St. Louis County that borders the City of St. Louis. A railroad line was built in 1855 making Jennings a hub of industrialization in the economic boom after WWII. Population growth for Jennings peaked in 1940 at nearly 20,000 residents.

At that time, the West Florissant Business Corridor developed into a major commercial and cultural hub for the region. However, Jennings, like many inner-ring, post-WWII suburban communities, was impacted by racism and racist policies including redlining and racially restrictive covenants that encouraged white flight and devalued real estate resulting in massive disinvestment in Jennings. This now majority Back municipality has limited access to crucial resources, a crumbling infrastructure, and an overall decreased quality of life.

In March the Missouri Department of Natural Resources provided the City of Jennings an assessment identifying potential brownfield sites on Jennings Station Road and the West Florissant Corridor to target redevelopment planning. The data collected during the Brownfields Inventory will be used to assist the City of Jennings' Economic Development with strategic planning to prioritize potential brownfield sites for future environmental investigations prior to redevelopment. The study area consisted of 151 commercial and residential parcels.

The City of Jennings is using the information gathered through this assessment to request technical assistance from the EPA via their Building Blocks for Sustainable Communities, Planning for Equitable Development Tool. The West Florissant Business Corridor in Jennings consists of 6 blocks, containing 41 storefronts and three vacant lots. The vacancy rate along this stretch of West Florissant is 27% and 28 of the stores are considered blighted Brownfields, while three, 6401, 6819, and 6900 West Florissant Avenue also have probable environmental concerns.

Guided by community input, Jennings wants to transform the West Florissant corridor into a safe, walkable, and environmentally-just business district that meets the community's needs. Jennings is committed to making this a reality with support to access adequate resources.



Business Finance

The Business Finance division of the St. Louis Economic Development Partnership plays a pivotal role in assisting businesses with diverse financing options. Notable success stories within the Promise Zone area include:

Iron Hops Brewing Company LLC

Located in Produce Row in the historic Old North St. Louis, Iron Hops Brewing Company LLC operates a cutting-edge production facility. Leveraging the support of the St. Louis Economic Development Partnership, they recently secured an SBA 504 loan amounting to \$112,000. This financial boost facilitated the creation of six job opportunities, contributing to both local employment and economic growth.



Freddie Lee's Ghetto Sauce

A dynamic addition to downtown St. Louis, Freddie Lee's Ghetto Sauce has established its manufacturing facility with the culinary prowess of husband-and-wife owners, Freddie and Deborah James. Specializing in crafting versatile all-purpose sauces suitable for marinating, dipping, and enhancing various dishes, they received financing through two loans totaling \$650,000. The collaborative efforts of the St. Louis Local Development Company, staffed by the St. Louis Economic Development Partnership, and the St. Louis Development Corporation, along with the St. Louis Community Credit Union, played a crucial role in securing this funding for Freddie Lee's Ghetto Sauce.

Goebel & Co. Furniture

Goebel Furniture, a distinguished local high-end furniture enterprise nestled in North St. Louis, has successfully expanded its horizons. This was made possible through a strategic partnership with the St. Louis Economic Development Partnership's Business Finance team, securing a substantial \$300,000 Economic Development Administration (EDA) Loan. Goebel Furniture proudly unveils its latest venture, the Kindred Heirloom Collection. The collection, thoughtfully curated and crafted, encompasses an array of chairs, tables, bed frames, and more.

Deluxe Hospitality LLC

Deluxe Hospitality LLC, part of Haven Hotel, replaced a Days Inn and Extend A Stay Suites. The experienced proprietors moved from Atlanta to Hazelwood, MO, aiming to make their mark. With a \$746,000 SBA 504 loan, they retained 11 jobs, created 7 new positions, and rebranded the establishment, ushering in a new era of hospitality excellence for the community and boosting Hazelwood's economy.

Labyrinth Smart Mobility Inc.

Labyrinth Smart Mobility Inc. revolutionizes urban mobility with low-speed electric vehicles in Downtown St. Louis. They obtained a \$120,000 loan for 4 more vehicles, secured a \$1 million contract, and plan to create 10 new jobs while expanding services in the city.

R+R Marketplace

R&R Marketplace was partially funded by STL Partnership's Heartland Regional Investment Fund.

The redevelopment will be a mixed-use facility that will foster new opportunities for jobs, childcare, healthcare services, and more. It will include the creation of 100 jobs within one year and 2,000 jobs within five years.

"The R&R Marketplace will be a great asset to the North County community", said Jeff Colona, New Markets Tax Credits Director at STL Partnership. "We are proud to be included in this partnership and are excited about the future of Dellwood and surrounding areas."



St. Louis Development Corporation's Roadmap to Economic Justice

The St. Louis Development Corporation (SLDC) and the City of St. Louis Mayor's Office have created a plan to use American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to reverse decades of economic decline in North St. Louis. The Economic Justice Action Plan lays out specific steps the city must take to seek to create long-lasting economic growth for the residents and businesses in St. Louis. The plan outlines five primary goals, along with three pillars of action.

Five primary goals:

Strengthen neighborhoods Close the wealth gap Improve healthy & education outcomes Expand the tax base Grow the City's population



Three pillars of action:

Equitable inclusive development: incentive reform site assembly & development commercial corridor revitalization

Neighborhood transformation: neighborhood capacity building vacancy & environmental justice housing accessibility

Economic empowerment: business empowerment workforce development educational justice.

The plan also includes a survey that lists top priorities from the community, as well as an evaluation of different parts of the city on indicators of need and opportunity, such as high unemployment rate or if a neighborhood has a community development corporation.

An estimated total of \$246 million plan to be invested by December 31, 2026.

Build Back Better Regional Challenge

A collaborative effort by Greater St. Louis Inc. and the St. Louis Economic Development Partnership (STL Partnership) and other community partners, helped bring a federal EDA Build Back Better Regional Challenge grant worth \$25 million to the region.

<u>AMICSTL</u>: The centerpiece of the propsal is to create the Advanced Manufacturing Innovation Center St. Louis (AMICSTL) as a new innovation anchor institution in North St. Louis City, which is physically adjacent to Ranken Technical College. Greater St. Louis Inc. and STL Partnership will co-lead implementation of the award providing overall guidance, governance, execution, and community engagement.

Local community leaders are developing a 20-page concept paper outlining the vision of a Manufacturing Innovation District in the historically dis-invested, marginalized neighborhoods around AMICSTL in North St. Louis City that would serve as a focal point for manufacturing innovation, talent and workforce development, and community revitalization.

AMICSTL has advanced its capital campaign for construction with significant commitments from state, local, private, and philanthropic partners and is beginning to staff up and prepare for groundbreaking and its programmatic soft-launch in early 2024.

<u>Harris-Stowe State University (HSSU):</u> The MECCA Accelerator has welcomed 72 participants with an expected graduation rate of 70 percent. The accelerator is designed to provide support to underrepresented students and members of the St. Louis community to help them find success in business.

Rung for Women: Recruitment for Rung for Women's first cohort in Advanced Manufacturing began in June 2023 with a targeted marketing campaign combined with a personalized outreach strategy. The latest cohort of Rung members were given the option of selecting advanced manufacturing as their training emphasis. When the cohort began, 18 women identified an interest in advanced manufacturing.



USDA to Build New Food Safety and Inspection Service Midwestern Laboratory in Normandy

The U.S. Department of Agriculture celebrated the groundbreaking of a new Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) Midwestern Laboratory in Normandy, Missouri on May 24. The St. Louis lab is one of three in the country. This new lab will address present and future public health challenges through science and technology to ensure that our nation's meat, poultry and processed egg supply is safe and properly labeled.

Economic Justice Accelerator

To commemorate 314 Day, the St. Louis Development Corporation (SLDC) announced the formation of the Economic Justice Accelerator, a fund designed to leverage public funding, private equity and philanthropic investment to sustain the Economic Justice Action Plan through and beyond 2026.

Northside Economic Empowerment Center



The City of St. Louis is putting millions of federal COVID relief dollars toward economic initiatives in north St. Louis. The work started with the opening of a new center to encourage economic development in the area.

The Northside Economic Empowerment Center is funded by \$1.5 million from the American Rescue Plan Act and is part of the St. Louis Development Corporation.

The NEEC is a strategic, centralized center focusing on business empowerment, capacity building and workforce development for businesses and residents. The NEEC supports WBE/MBE contractors by providing access to technical assistance, capital, and back-office support services. Workforce development services and training opportunities are also available for residents.

15 volunteers helped distribute a total of 150 bags and participated in thoughtful dialogue around effective community engagement strategies, capacity building and small business support.

The St. Louis Promise Zone program partners with local leaders to give communities proven tools to rebuild and put people back to work. Our federal designation, which lasts 10 years, is a catalyst for ongoing collaboration and change that will drive regional growth and create a better, more inclusive St. Louis region.





HEALTH & WELLNESS

Building Inclusive and Resilient Communities

Food insecurity has been reported by families in North St. Louis County and City, as a critical problem due the COVID-19 pandemic. To reduce food insecurity in North St. Louis City and North St. Louis County, Missouri Building Inclusive and Resilient Communities (MO BRIC) used three approaches: using a client choice model for food pantries and food banks, improving transportation barriers to food access points, and increasing spaces for residents to grow their own healthy food, including, community gardens, urban farms, mobile markets, community owned grocery stores, and farmers markets. Current MO BRIC partners are primarily located and acting in six neighborhoods: Spanish Lake, The Ville, Hyde Park, Jeff Vander Lou, Forest Park Southeast and Kingshighway East.

MO BRIC created a collective on equitable nutrition security, food sovereignty and food justice, that includes representation from food banks, food pantries, farmers markets, community gardens, senior centers, urban farms, mobile markets, and community-owned grocery stores. Local partners and implementers of MO BRIC include: Trailnet, St. Louis Area Agency on Aging, Operation Food Search, St. Louis Food Area Bank, BJC Community Health Improvement, Missouri Coalition for the Environment (MCE), Fit and Food Connection, A Red Circle, Emerson YMCA, Spanish Lake Community Development Committee, Great Rivers Greenway, Urban Harvest, Metro Market, City Greens, Da Hood Connect, Transform 314, Phi Global Farm, Robert Fulton INC, North Side Youth and Senior Center, Wesley House, City Greens, Integrated Health Network and Be Well Cafe.

A primary focus of the MO BRIC efforts has concentrated on the need to build resilience within the emergency system as it relates to getting those in need of healthy foods and getting them there safely. Trailnet has been a key partner in helping community gardens, farmers markets and senior centers make the streets adjacent to their locations safe places for people to engage in active transportation through the implementation of calm streets pilot and demonstration projects. A close collaboration with the Metro Market, which functions as a farmer's market on wheels, selling groceries and other grocery items at a reduced cost in neighborhoods with limited food access, is helping MO BRIC rethink the way we are talking about food banking and other ways in which they can meet people where they are.

A Red Circle

In 2018, when a Shop 'n Save outlet closed in her North County neighborhood, Erica Williams, founder and executive director of A Red Circle, set out to find partners to build a grocery store for an area that is defined as a food desert.

A Red Circle, a non-profit organization, received nearly \$1.5 million in federal funding through the Economic Development Initiative/Community Project Funding program of the U.S. Congress to build The North County Community Nexus. The Nexus is a grocery store that will feature local urban farmers' produce, a bistro serving grab-and-go-meals made with farm fresh produce, and a shared culinary kitchen and small-scale production space for chefs.

The building will also house the Learning and Opportunity Center for community service programming, education about nutrition and healthy foods, and a space for small businesses.

The Nexus and Learning and Opportunity Center are slated to open in spring of 2025 and will employ around 20 people.

Show Me Healthy Homes

A collaboration led by the St. Louis County Department of Public Health (DPH) was awarded a \$1.8 million federal grant in 2022 from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes to implement the Show-Me Missouri Healthy Homes Program in St. Louis County and Kansas City.

The program's primary goal is to improve the health and safety of families through home assessments and remediation in targeted communities in both regions. DPH and its partners focus on HUD's eight Healthy Home Principles: keeping homes clean, dry, pest-free, contaminant-free, safe, ventilated, comfortable, and maintained. Radon testing is also offered for each home enrolled in the program. DPH is the lead agency administering the HUD Healthy Homes Production grant. In the St. Louis region local partners include the Community Action Agency of St. Louis County and the Missouri Botanical Garden's EarthWays Center.

St Louis Promise Zone remains the highest priority area in St. Louis County. In 2023 the DPH held three municipal presentations about the grant in Ferguson, Northwoods, and Pine Lawn. These cities are helping to promote the program by delivering flyers to residents.

HUD has approved the Tier 1 Environmental Reviews for 60 homes in the St. Louis Promise Zone. Initial healthy home assessments have been completed for over 20 homes and 24 radon tests have been completed in St. Louis County to date.

The program is also working to increase the number of professionals in St. Louis County with knowledge of healthy home issues through healthy homes training courses intended for audiences including contractors, health educators, and housing and environmental professionals. For National Healthy Homes month in June, DPH offered two courses in collaboration with the Missouri Botanical Gardens/Earthways Center: Building Science Principles and Healthy Homes Principles. These courses were targeted to the trades industry and community organizations that provide healthy home services.

Addressing Vacancy in St. Louis County

The recent local government initiative in St. Louis County, MO, stands as a beacon of transformative change as the Department of Revenue rethinks how we do business. The County Recorder of Deed and the County Collector of Revenue work in collaboration towards the St. Louis County goal to eliminate vacant properties, especially in low to moderate-income neighborhoods.

The Collector of Revenue is enhancing the Delinquent Property program by implementing equitable and efficient processes, including payment plans and connecting taxpayers with legal services. Additional staff has been hired to improve revenue compliance on delinquent accounts and prevent actions that could jeopardize homeownership. By identifying 61% of vacant properties with significant tax payment delinquency, the initiative aims to streamline the search process for potential buyers, as well as improve the return of properties to the tax roll.

The Recorder of Deeds, in partnership with the County Department of Human Services and Legal Services of Eastern Missouri (LSEM), now ensure that eligible residents are able to receive estate planning and legal services at little to no cost fostering a greater appreciation of property ownership. This comprehensive effort reflects a commitment to a brighter future, where all St. Louis County neighborhoods thrive, residents prosper, and a revitalized sense of community prevails.

SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES

Community Building Network (CBN)

Over the past year, the Community Building Network (CBN) has played a pivotal role in enhancing the capacities and effectiveness of key member organizations operating within the Promise Zone, specifically Dream Builders 4 Equity, Old North Restoration, LinkStL, North County Inc, North Newstead Association, and Beyond Housing. CBN has focused on organizational assessments, individualized work plans, and capacity building in critical areas through a series of targeted initiatives and collaborative efforts.

Key Activities and Impact:

Organizational Assessments:

- o Conducted comprehensive assessments for each member organization to identify strengths, challenges, and growth opportunities.
- Utilized data-driven insights to tailor interventions that align with the unique needs of DB4E, Old North Restoration, LinkStL, North County Inc, North Newstead Association, and Beyond Housing.

Individualized Work Plans:

- o Developed customized work plans for each organization, outlining specific strategies for growth and improvement.
- Emphasized areas such as Financial Diversification, Performance Measurement and Evaluation, Economic Development, Board Effectiveness, Staff and Volunteer Management, and Collaborations and Partnership Building.

Capacity Building and Technical Support:

- o Provided hands-on support to strengthen financial management practices, ensuring sustainability and resilience.
- o Offered guidance on establishing robust performance measurement and evaluation frameworks for evidence-based decision-making.
- o Facilitated discussions on economic development strategies tailored to the unique challenges and opportunities within the Promise Zone.

Evening Brew in the Old North Neighborhood Gathering (October):

- Hosted a community-building event bringing together stakeholders, including Mike Woods from Dream Builders 4 Equity.
- o Provided a platform for networking, knowledge sharing, and fostering collaborations to drive equitable development.

What's Brewing in Affordable Housing Gathering Event at Beyond Housing (November):

- o Organized a focused event highlighting the importance of affordable housing.
- o Facilitated panel discussion on innovative solutions, with a spotlight on member organizations' efforts, contributing to community-driven housing solutions.

Midwest Climate Summit

Promise Zone team members, Lavoughnda White and Maude Trost recently attended the Midwest Climate Summit at Washington University.

During the conference, Lavoughnda White hosted a meeting on climate resiliency with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of the Assistant Secretary for Health (OASH) and U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) at Washington University.

The meeting included a brief presentation about the concept of a health-integrated climate resilience hub, with the region 9 initiative in Sacramento as an illustrative example. This meeting facilitated discussion about planning related to safety net health services and climate resilience in St. Louis. Climate Resilience Hubs are intended to increase capacity in vulnerable communities and build resilience in the face of



natural and other disasters, including safety net health and human services as critical components. Climate Resilience Hubs encompass emergency preparedness services, public health, medical services, as well as state and local government services.

Wellington Family Homes

The St. Louis Economic Development Partnership joined local officials, community leaders, and partners for the Wellington Family Homes groundbreaking ceremony in Wellston, Missouri.

Wellston Community Empowerment Corporation and Housing Authority of St. Louis County partnered with Knight Development to demolish 15 units and develop 186 new housing units for the Wellington Family Homes Development Project. The development is expected to serve low-to-moderate income families and the properties will target individuals with children and formerly homeless individuals and families.



West Florissant Great Streets

The West Florissant Avenue Great Streets (WFGS) project is a collaborative effort between the St. Louis County Department of Transportation and Public Works, Ferguson and Dellwood Cities, and the East-West Gateway Council of Governments (EWGCG). This initiative aims to rejuvenate West Florissant Avenue, transforming it into a vibrant hub for commerce, community engagement, and comfortable living.

The project, aligned with EWGCG's Great Streets Initiative, focuses on revamping West Florissant Avenue to boost mobility, connectivity, and local identity, while fostering economic development. Similar transformations are underway on Grand Avenue, Natural Bridge Avenue, and Page Avenue, exemplifying a broader regional commitment to revitalization.

Securing an \$18.2M grant in 2021 from the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) program marked a significant milestone. A year later, the project achieved another milestone with the approval of the preliminary design plan for the corridor. In July 2023, the project team hosted a successful community open house, drawing 109 attendees eager to witness the final plan presentation before right-of-way acquisition and construction commence in 2024.

Wellston Demolition

The Land Clearance for Redevelopment Authority (LCRA) of St. Louis County is committed to helping the City of Wellston redevelop the residential base of the community by creating clean buildable sites where uninhabitable and dangerous dilapidated houses previously stood. In 2023 four structures were demolished in the Lulu Heights neighborhood. The LCRA is working with the remaining homeowners, the City of Wellston and potential developers to redevelop the area.

Library Box Locator




REDUCE SERIOUS & VIOLENT CRIME
